# drivers ed 101

# Where Rubber Meets Road - Part 1

In the last installment we looked at the technique of "rotating" La car into a corner, i.e., purposely putting it into the beginning stages of a spin as we turn in, thus allowing us to improve our exit

speed as we track out. This technique can be extremely effective. In reality, however, most stock production cars tend to be uncooperative due to the inherent understeer designed into them. Most won't rotate at all, and those that do tend to, revert to understeer as soon as the driver goes back to power mid-way through the corner. This is one of the reasons your stock production car likely won't do some of the things you ask of it as your driving becomes more advanced.

In Part 1 of this installment we'll look at a couple of things you can do to help balance your car that don't involve removing weight from your wallet. In Part 2, we'll view the contact patch from the perspective of those components that will remove weight from your wallet. Don't worry however, Part 2 has been timed to arrive on the same day as your tax refund check.

In order for a car to rotate into a corner under braking, and continue to point through the corner as we go back to power, it must be set up to handle either neutrally or with a tendency to oversteer. In the old days, this was done almost exclusively by increasing the relative pressure of, or even over-inflating, the rear tires. This accomplishes two things: First, it stiffens the sidewalls of the rear tires so that weight transferred from the chassis under cornering arrives at the contact patch more quickly. The rear contact patch will reach and begin to exceed its limit before the front contact patch. The second thing we accomplish by increasing the rear tire pressures is to change the shape of the contact patch.

The illustrations in fig. 1 are exaggerated to give you a better idea of the effect of pressure changes; the arrows show the direction of travel and the darker areas represent the greatest loading. The properly inflated tire will have a contact patch that is loaded fairly uniformly. The under-inflated tire will have a contact patch that is more "hourglass" shaped, with the loading concentrated at the sides. The tire that is over-inflated will have an elongated, more oval-shaped contact patch with the highest loading concentrated at the center. While increasing the pressure of the rear tires may help balance the car, keep in mind that it does so partly by reducing available grip (g). Keep in mind also that some cars respond counter-intuitively, that is the rear end can be loosened up by slightly under-inflating the rear tires or over-inflating the front tires. Be prepared to try both.

The only way to determine optimum tire pressures, however, is to spend \$75 on an infrared pyrometer (thermometer) with laser sighting. This tool allows you to accurately measure the relative temperatures, after several hot laps, of the outer edge, the center and the inner edge of the tread. The three numbers grouped

beneath each contact patch represent tire temperatures that one might find using a pyrometer. Once the optimum tire pressures are established, changing front or rear pressure by plus or minus a


> few pounds will give you some control over the balance of your car.

> A word of warning: Please make note of the words "a few pounds." When tire pressures vary too much from optimum levels we begin to see diminishing returns, and in fact we may put our-

> A tire with too little pressure is extremely compliant. All this extra movement creates friction and heat in the tire carcass, along with a corresponding increase in tire pressure. As the carcass heats up it also begins to weaken, and the pressure increase may be adequate to cause the tire to blow.

Further, when we lower the tire pressure below optimum levels we move the burden of cornering to the outside edges of the tread instead of spreading it evenly across the contact patch. This localized loading can create extreme heat, particularly in the outer edge of the tread. Grip begins to fall off as we "cook" our tires, and the tread can begin to "chunk," meaning surprisingly large pieces of rubber will begin to fly out of the wheel wells.

When we over-inflate our tires, we localize the loading in the center of the tread and a similar dynamic can occur. In both cases, rapid tire damage can create dangerous handling characteristics, not to mention significantly shortening the life span of your tires.

For the reasons mentioned above, and because the same set of tires will respond differently on different cars, we're not going to give sample pressures in this article. We'll simply reiterate that the only way to determine proper tire inflation for any given car or any given track is to check tread temperatures after a few hot laps using a pyrometer.

There are a couple of other simple and economical methods of balancing your car, one of which we can borrow from the SCCA Spec Racer class. It's a little less orthodox, in a slap-yourself-in-the-forehead kind of way, but effective nonetheless. Back when the Spec Racer Ford was first introduced it was called the Sports Renault, and it had horrible understeer. Perhaps the SCCA thought this was good idea, or perhaps there was an engineering miscal-culation. Regardless, the racers who spent their good money on

Sports Renaults screamed bloody murder because, as everybody knows, driving a car with inherent understeer is about as much fun as a poke in the eye. The SCCA responded by increasing the width, and therefore grip, of the front tires. Problem solved.

Just because BMW puts XXX/XXRXX tires on your car doesn't mean you're contractually obligated to use the same size, or relative sizes, every time you swap rubber. If your car has a push, put a little more meat on the front, or a little less in the rear (remember that an increase in tread width will have a corresponding increase in tire diameter if the aspect ratio remains the same).

There are also no laws requiring the same model, or even brand, tires to be used front and rear. When the Skip Barber Racing School used to run E30 M3s, they would put Goodyear Eagles on the front, and Eagle GTs (all seasons) on the rear. This balanced the cars.

You might put gumballs from Yokohama on the front, and rocks from General on the rear. Some might view this as sacrilege. You'll have to decide yourself whether you want to be pious with a push, or a heathen with a... never mind. The point is to balance your car, and you might be surprised to learn that putting lesser tires on the rear of an understeering car can actually lower lap times. Not that you'd know it, of course.

Next time we'll continue our intricate foray into the all-important contact patch.

# **New Hampshire Firsts**

### **Back Roads Rally 2008?**

New Hampshire is a land of many firsts: From the first citizen to become U.S. Attorney General (Samuel Shelburne in 1789), to the first American in space (Alan Shepard in 1961). Maybe connecting some of these "historic points" could make an interesting route for a future Back Roads Rally???

» The first-in-the-nation Presidential Primary election is held in the Granite State every four years. Until the 1992 elections, no candidate had ever won the Presidency without first winning in New Hampshire.



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- » In 1775, New Hampshire became the first state to declare its independence from England.
- » In 1793, Samuel Morey of Orford invented the internal combustion engine and built the first steamship in the United States.
- » The first American in space, Alan Shepard, was born in Derry, New Hampshire. His historic flight was made in 1961.
- The first private citizen in the history of space flight was Christa McAuliffe, a Concord schoolteacher. After her death in the Challenger Space Shuttle disaster, a planetarium was built in her honor in Concord.
- Wolfeboro became the first summer resort in America, when the summer home of Royal Governor John Wentworth was built in 1767.
- » In 1963 New Hampshire adopted the first legal state lottery in the United States.
- » The first commissioned naval officer in the United States was Captain Hopley Yeaton of New Castle, who was commissioned in 1791.
- » John Langdon of New Hampshire was named the first President Pro-Tem of the U.S. Senate in 1789.
- » Samuel Shelburne of Portsmouth was the first Attorney General of the United States. He was named to the post in 1789.
- » The first potato was planted north of the Rio Grande at Londonderry Common Field, in 1719.
- » Levi Hutchins of Concord invented the first alarm clock in 1787. It only rang at 4 a.m., the time he got up.
- » The world record for the highest ground wind speed of 372 km per hour (231 miles per hour) was recorded on Mt. Washington on April 12, 1934.
- » The first patent for an artificial leg belonged to Benjamin Palmer of Meredith, who patented the Palmer Leg in 1846.
- Thomas Goodall of Troy designed the first horse blanket in 1850.
- » The Nansen Ski Club, the first ski club in the country, was formed in 1882 in Berlin.
- » The first fire alarm system using the telegraph was designed by Moses Farmer of Boscawen in 1847.
- » Isaac Orr of Bedford made the first airtight wood stove.
- » The New Hampshire's Legislature was the first to adopt a 10-hour work day in 1847.
- » La Caisse Populaire, St. Mary's Bank in Manchester, established the first credit union in the United States in 1908.
- » The first intercollegiate boat race in North America happened on Lake Winnipesaukee in August 1853, when Harvard beat Yale.

Welcome to BMWCCA.org 2.0, the revamped BMW Car Club of America website. We've added more content, more forums, and a gallery for photos. Other than the News section created by BMWCCA.org writers and photographs, responsibility for the vibrancy and popularity of the site belongs to BMW CCA's 75,000 members who contribute material. Here's a quick guide to the site.

Be sure to join the site by filling out a brief form and choosing a username and password. Do this even if you have a username from the old site, since old logons don't carry over. BMW CCA members should link their member numbers and names for fullest site access (electronic Roundel, tech guru answers, free classifieds). Your member number is on the wrapper of Roundel, your chapter newsletter, your membership card, or available through the club office, 864-250-0022.

The main sections of the site are striped across the site header (where it says BMW Car Club of America: You Belong Here): Home page, News, Events (calendar), Forums, Reviews, Gallery (photos, videos), Marketplace (classified, club regalia), and Chapters.

Anyone can post a product Review, not just website staff. Same goes for the Gallery. You'll find both staff-generated reviews as well as member reviews of products you've worked with. Check out Jonathan Spira's excellent reviews of more than two dozen Bluetooth cellphones; it's the most extensive compatibility testing you'll find anywhere.

If you've been dying to have us or Roundel photograph your project car, now you can do it yourself. We expect Gallery will be one of the site's most popular sections.

In Forums, you can ask technical questions and get expert answers from club tech gurus as well as other members. The Tech Talk forums cover topics that cross model lines (service, wheels & tires, audio-video-electronics) while Model Discussions forums let you dive deep with your favorite model. We've also got sections for BMW Competition and General forums, including Off Topic, where you can sound off on anything: Porsches, Obama, great vacations, or teen driving. If you've got comments on the site, go to Feedback. Please: Tell us what you think.

Marketplace is where you'll find BMW CCA classifieds. Submit ads here that appear both online and in Roundel magazine (free for BMW CCA members). With the new site, we've made several improvements: Online ad posts can have up to five photos per ad (Roundel still accepts one photo per ad, for a fee). We've reduced the cost of ads for non-members to \$5 an ad for online (but there are still plenty of benefits that make membership a great deal); if it makes a difference, you can easily skim ads to see who's a club member.

Chapters information provides a list of chapters, chapter contacts, and information and forms for chapter officers.

Click on the Roundel magazine tab and you'll find something new: electronic editions of current and recent past issues of the magazine. You'll need to be a BMW CCA member to gain access.

If anything on the site doesn't work quite the way you expect, try it a second time. If you can't find it, use the Search button. Our forum and reviews sections are based on the popular vBulletin, while the photo gallery uses PhotoPost, so it may all be familiar already. # VMP and Club Motorsports Court Supports Operational Plan

February 25,2008

TAMWORTH, N.H. – The United States District Court, District of New Hampshire, has denied Focus Tamworth's appeal of the US Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE) Federal Wetland Permit issued under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act to Club Motorsports (CMI). The Court completely rejected all Focus Tamworth's positions and arguments, and fully supported the ACOE's and Club Motorsports'.



VMP: 3 miles, 18 turns

Almost fourteen months after the permit was first issued, an appeal was filed by members of the opposition group, Focus Tamworth on October 2, 2006. The Court noted that Focus' only challenged the federal wetland permit on the sound limits reviewed and approved by the ACOE and did not challenge the findings concerning the approval to fill the wetlands. In its written opinion dated February 14, 2008, the Court stated, "...the Corps adequately explained its conclusion that the restrictions proposed by (Club) Motorsports represented a fair and reasonable balance between the needs of the developer, the desires of the community, and the overall well-being of the local environment."

"We are very pleased that the Court has upheld the ACOE's decision to issue our project a federal wetland permit," said CMI President Jim Hoenscheid. "For over eighteen months, the ACOE conducted a rigorous and exhaustive review of our application. The ACOE reviewed the application and was not influenced by speculation, hypothetical scenarios, or irrational fear about the project. The Corps applied their expertise when reviewing the project's engineering designs that protect both the surface and subsurface water. When reviewing the non-wetland related topics including sound, the ACOE appropriately compared our project to other road courses and motorsports country clubs and took into account many other factors including the existing commercial/industrial businesses that surround our property and other activities that generate noise everyday in Tamworth. As we stated in September of 2005 when the Corps first issued CMI the federal wetland permit, we are proud that our project meets and exceeds the high standards and requirements of the federal permit. With the Federal Court's own eight month review and decision to uphold the CMI permit, our position has been validated. Moreover, when CMI is afforded an independent and comprehensive review, CMI has proven the project will not harm the surrounding environment.

"Two separate and distinct arms of the federal government conducted a thorough review and approved the sound limits outlined in the CMI Operating Plan. As supported by the ACOE permit and the Court's decision, "...the operation of the Motorsports' facility subject to the proposed noise limits would not have an unaccept-

able adverse effect on municipal water supplies ... wildlife, or recreational areas.' In terms of sound limits at Lime Rock, the Court noted that the facility operates as a "hybrid" with both restricted days and numerous unrestricted or unlimited days. The Court commented that it suspected that the plaintiffs (Focus Tamworth) would be far less content with a change from the CMI Operating Plan approved by the ACOE to the actual sound generated at Lime Rock. Based on the decision by the ACOE and the Federal Court, the Focus Tamworth's proposed sound limit of 69 decibels maximum at the CMI property line would be completely arbitrary and capricious. The ACOE and the Court both saw through Focus' weak arguments and illogical conclusions."

In its February 14, 2008 ruling, the Court made the following noteworthy findings:

- » "Interestingly, plaintiffs' challenge is not related to any potential adverse effects the proposed facility might have on water quality in the area."
- "The administrative record in this case consists of more than 4,500 pages, divided into nine volumes. Plaintiffs do not assert (nor is there any suggestion in the record that) the Corps' failed to consider all the evidence presented to it."
- » "Here, the court cannot conclude that the Corps acted outside the scope of its wide discretion in issuing the permit."
- » "...after carefully reviewing the record before it, the Corps provided a reasonable, logical, and thorough explanation for it's decision to accept (Club) Motorsports' proposed operating plan."
- "In light of the record of evidence on sound restrictions at similar facilities, and the various expert opinions relating to sound generation at (Club) Motorsports' facility itself (including Mr. Cowan's suggestions), it was not unreasonable, nor was it an abuse of discretion, for the Corps to conclude that (Club) Motorsports' proposed operating plan was acceptable."

In addition to the federal wetland permit, CMI has secured all required federal and state environmental related construction permits for both the construction and operation of the motorsports country club. In 2004, the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NH DES) issued both a "Wetlands and Non-Site Specific Permit" and an Alteration of Terrain or "Site Specific" Permit to CMI. In April 2005, NH DES denied the opposition group, Focus Tamworth's appeal of the state wetland permit. In 2005, NH DES issued a Water Quality Certificate that further demonstrates CMI's ability to protect both surface and ground water resources. CMI is currently appealing the town's denial of two permits under the Tamworth Wetland Ordinance including the recent decision to deny CMI access to the property.

A first-of-its-kind concept for New England, the Valley Motorsports Park development is located in wooded land on the north face of Mount Whittier off Route 25 in Tamworth, approximately two miles west of the intersection of Routes 25 and 16. Described as a "ribbon through the woods," the road course would be available for use by its members, much like a golf course country club. The \$28 million purpose built development includes a more than three-mile, 18-turn, European-style road course for drivers and motorcyclists to develop and practice their driving skills and attend performance and safety driving schools.
